


Who would enjoy it?

It was challenging but thrilling!



Amazing and daring story about escape from Nazi prison camp during WW2. Very emotional reading



It is an entertaining and comforting story, but it also contains important lessons about the world and human relationships.


Who would enjoy it?

The themes of revenge, justice and redemption struck a chord with me in my teenage years.





It is a story of rebellion and growing up. As a 16 year old, these were two themes that felt very relevant to me!




Who would enjoy it?


Who would enjoy it?


Who would enjoy it?
