Restoration and Rebuilding

Some thoughts on Ezra and Nehemiah

In recent weeks I have been thinking about the Old Testament books of Ezra and Nehemiah. They record the events of the return of the Jewish people to their land and city after 70 years of exile in Babylon. It was a difficult time for those that returned, but their experiences are relevant to us in our times. Let us take a brief look at three things that we can learn.

1. The goodness of the Lord. Names in the Bible have meanings. Look at the three names in Nehemiah 1 verses 1 and 2. Here they are; '**Nehemiah** the son of **Hachaliah**' and '**Hanani** one of my brothers' What do these three names mean? Firstly, Nehemiah means 'The Lord comforts', Hachaliah means 'Wait for the Lord' and Hanani ' means 'The Lord is Gracious'

Putting these together, but not in the same order, we can form this idea about God, "The Lord is gracious, wait for Him, He will comfort you". Thoughts precious and true.

2. There are three main characters in the account of the return to Jerusalem. Zerubabbel, Ezra and Nehemiah. Space prevents us from doing an in-depth study of each, but let us observe this; one was just an ordinary member of society, one was a priest, and one was a highly placed official. Diverse, yet each one just serving the Lord in their own place. They did not choose to lead the three phases of the return from exile, rather it was God who chose and placed them in positions of leadership to accomplish His plans.

This draws us to Proverbs 3:5 & 6. **"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding, In all your ways, acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths."** Rather than fretting and worrying about our plans for our lives and careers, we should rather ask Him to lead us, and allow Him to work what is best for us.

3. Our last lesson, but certainly not the only one we can learn, is this; despite opposition, danger, ridicule, misrepresentation and deception directed against the people and their leaders, the work of restoration was completed. It took many years, but God's plan to rebuild the Temple and the city was completed. His plans always are.

Child of God through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ , hear His word to you; "I know the plans I have for you" declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future...When you seek me with all your heart, I <u>will</u> be found by you." Jeremiah 29:11 – 14.
