'Christmas is cancelled!' ran the headline in a tabloid newspaper last month. For a moment, you could be forgiven for thinking you had been transported back to 1647, when the then Puritan government banned the celebration of Christmas, replaced it with a day of fasting and locked many churches to prevent services. "Bah humbug!" Not much comfort and joy there then!

A disease, a pandemic or any other person or thing can never, however, ban Christmas; just as one could never ban the snow that falls on a spruce Christmas tree in a Norwegian forest. For Christmas, as we know, is not the incessant playing of Slade's "So here it is merry Christmas..." for the umpteenth time since November 1st, nor is it the turkey with all its trimmings, though that certainly helps. Yes, we can ban or cancel the superfluous 'fripperies' as the poet Betjeman once called them, but nevertheless, we shall still have Christmas. We are empty, lifeless, and directionless without it. For a created thing can never completely fill the void, the longing that lies in the heart and soul of each of us except the God made human at Christmas. And this Christmas God-child, aware of our need, rushes to help us. As Wisdom so beautifully puts it: 'down from the heavens, from the royal throne, leapt your all-powerful Word' (18:5). John's gospel echoes this theme when it speaks of the "Word" becoming flesh. In the Greek thought of the period, it meant equally the "meaning" became one of us. That is, the meaning to everything: the meaning to the existence of the universe and to the meaning of life, was born at Christmas. The meaning of the world came so close to us that we can 'touch him with our hands and see him with our eyes' (1 John 1). An incredible thought!

In spite of all that has happened this horrendous year, Christmas is not cancelled. God knows we are lost without love and solace, and Love was made visible that first Christmas night and does become so every Christmas. Yes, Christmas is very much with us, or rather, is lived among us. It is the birth of the Christ-child, the Emmanuel, the God-is-with-us in all our tribulations, bringing us hope, comfort, peace and salvation from the dark and all that threatens us.

And to that we can say a very "Happy Christmas!"
