
Thought for the week Life as a Pilgrimage

Dear Friends in Christ,



for my final Sunday as parish priest of Rishton, as I resign on the 14th February. Not only do I leave Rishton, but I too begin a new chapter in my journey with our Lord as I also leave the Church of England to be received into the Roman Catholic Church. Why? Well, Mr Pountain hasn't given me the word count to go into that, and it's not the reasons behind my resolution I want us to ponder, but rather, importantly, the image of our journey with Christ as his disciples today. I love the image of pilgrimage for that, a sacrificial journey to a sacred place for us, a journey, we pray, to our heavenly home; and my second thought, the challenging decisions that we sometimes have to make as we follow Christ, the Way, the Truth and the Life (John 14.6).

The words with which I began are from Psalm 121, a section known as the Psalms of Pilgrimage. These were songs to accompany God's people as they journeyed, made pilgrimage, to Jerusalem, ultimately to the Temple. Travel today, when it's not a pandemic at least, is relatively safe and straightforward. If we decided to make a journey, anywhere in the world, it could be easily booked online and the travel present us with little real challenge. But imagine that journey thousands of years ago, indeed even a hundred years ago? It would have required careful planning, most likely cost a large sum to the average man or woman. It would have taken many more days, even weeks and months, than a flight or train journey today. When we look at our lives with Christ through the image of a pilgrimage let us remember that we are on a journey that requires utter and total determination and clear purpose. When Jesus was talking about the dedication required of his followers, he said this, 'No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the Kingdom of God.' (Luke 9.62). As we begin the season of Lent, preparation for the great feast of Holy Week and Easter, let us



keep our eyes firmly fixed on our discipleship with Christ, the Pilgrim Journey, and the eternal home he promises for his faithful. Let us always remember that our help, always, 'comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth'.

Secondly, challenges along the way. As we journey with Christ, it is inevitable that challenging decisions or difficult situations will arise. Indeed, Christ talks of it often in the Gospels. My decision to leave my parish and the Church of England to join brothers and sisters in the Roman Catholic Church has been an enormously challenging one to make, as much as I know it is of God's will. When challenges of one kind or another, little or large, come in our path first look to Jesus, his example in the scriptures, and commend it ALL to him in prayer. Secondly, and I found this such a blessing these past months, go to close Christian friends who can pray with you, for you, share with you and help you discern. And remember, as reflected and affirmed in the other verses of psalm 121, 'The Lord himself is your guardian' who 'will guard you from all evil' and 'guard your going out and coming in, from now and for evermore'. I'm beginning to learn, and it's taken me some years (!), that to face these challenges with prayerful confidence, striving for conviction of truth, we do not get weakened by the struggles. No, far from it, we are strengthened and become more of the image of Divine Love, the true reflection (1 Corinthians 13.12), we are called to be.

It's been a rich blessing indeed, my friends, to have shared in your wonderful, faith filled school community as part of my journey. Thank you so much for that. Please pray for me now as I begin a new chapter in my pilgrimage, as I for you.




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
