



#### **KS4 Book Recommendations**



Mark Haddon's best-selling story of how Christopher, a boy with Asperger's syndrome, sees the world and makes sense of it in his own particular way became a success for children and adults alike. When Christopher finds a dead dog on his neighbour's lawn he applies the principles he has learnt from Sherlock Holmes, his own literary hero, to the situation and so begins the narration of his own remarkable story.



Amber's parents strike her as eccentric, but nothing prepares her for the awful truth, revealed on her sixteenth birthday: they are demons, and so is she. Not that that will stop them from killing and eating her. Fleeing her parents, Amber embarks on a road-trip like no other. In the company of inscrutable bodyguard Miles and Glen, a gormless Irish hitchhiker with supernatural issues of his own, she speeds down America's Dark Highway, careering from one terrifying encounter to another, racing to complete a deal with the boss demon to save her life.



Will is only fifteen but he's experienced more violence and loss than most people might in an entire lifetime. His big brother Shawn was recently shot dead, right in front of him, but as "everybody knows", "gunshots make everybody/deaf and blind especially/when they make somebody/dead". While his mom mourns, "sobbing into her palms", Will knows what he has to do. He must follow the three rules: No crying. No snitching. Revenge. Armed with Shawn's gun, Will heads down six floors in an elevator on his revenge mission, thinking he knows exactly who he's going after.


## **KS5 Book Recommendations**
