KS3 Book Recommendations




A young lad determines to change his ways when the consequences of his bullying prank on a homeless man are laid bare.




A young dragon discovers that he is one of five dragonets destined to stop an endless, ancient war, but must decide whether he wants to fight or not.

A sixteen-year-old boy must learn to swim against an undercurrent of grief - or be swept away by it.




Three young women from different backgrounds join the Suffrage movement in the early 20th century just before World War I.

KS5 Book Recommendations




The Booker prize-winning sequel to The Handmaid's Tale.



The Prize is unique in that the winner is selected by judging panels made up of young people at schools across the country from a shortlist curated by an adult judging panel.'
