

KS3 Book Recommendations

Could these two girls ever become sisters? Is there room in Rosa's family for an African orphan haunted by lions? Is there room in their hearts?



In a digital world it's hard to know what's real. Imagine a world where your only friends are virtual, and big tech companies control access to food, healthcare and leisure.

This is Jess's world. But when she turns fourteen, Jess can go to school with other children for the first time. Most of them hate the 'real' world.

Jess risks everything by using skills forbidden in the cyber-world, only to stumble on something explosive.



A story about finding friendship when you're lonely - and hope when all you feel is fear. Twelve-year-old Matthew is trapped in his bedroom by crippling OCD, spending most of his time staring out of his window as the inhabitants of Chestnut Close go about their business. Until the day he is the last person to see his next door neighbour's toddler, Teddy, before he goes missing. Matthew must turn detective and unravel the mystery of Teddy's disappearance - with the help of a brilliant cast of supporting characters.

KS4 Book Recommendations





ALL THE TRUTH THAT'S IN ME is many things. It is a true romance, a story of desperate yearning and unrequited love.


It's a page-turning mystery full of twists and turns that will keep you guessing until the very end

KS5 Book Recommendations





But when tragedy strikes, and Miles comes face-to-face with death he discovers the value of living and loving unconditionally.




Every morning, Melanie waits in her cell to be collected for class.

She thinks they don't like her. She jokes that she won't bite. But they don't laugh. Melanie is a very special girl.



Library News

An update from our librarian

In January I launched our 'Reading Mentor' scheme. Pupils are encouraged to borrow picture books and share them with a younger member of their family e.g. a sibling, cousin or friend.

They read the story out loud, listening to the child read (if the child is able to read), discuss the story and pictures, what might happen next etc. I talk to the pupils each time they return a book, to see how it went and if I can offer any tips in case of any issues.

When pupils have shared 6 books with their child, they receive a 'Reading Leader' badge and certificate. The scheme is still in its infancy but we have had interest from seven pupils so far. Two of the pupils (both from Year 7) have completed the scheme. Congratulations to Hannah Ley and Emily Mitchell who both received their 'Reading Leader' badge and certificate.



World Book Day 2023

Year 7 marked World Book Day again on Friday 3rd March by dressing as a character from their favourite book, and donating a pound to the school Library.

As ever, it was a popular event, and we were most impressed with the imagination and flair of the pupils, who really got into the spirit of things. Costumes ranged from animals to wizards, via Cruella DeVil and Little Red Riding Hood. Most terrifying was a nearly lifesize Tyrannosaurus Rex, which towered over the corridors, and had some difficulty getting through the doorways.

As usual though, the point of the fun was to raise awareness of literacy, and to encourage pupils to do the most important thing they can to improve their educational opportunities: **Read!**
