An anxious, lonely person meets someone very similar at a party to which neither wanted to go and a tentative friendship begins.



A teenage girl starts writing to an American prisoner on Death Row about a traumatic incident that happened in her life.



The Dragonet Prophecy. Not every dragonet wants a destiny... Clay has grown up under the mountain, chosen along with four other dragonets to fulfil a mysterious prophecy and end the war between the dragon tribes of Pyrrhia. He's not so sure about the prophecy part, but Clay can't imagine not living with the other dragonets; they're his best friends. ## **KS5 Book Recommendations**



Silence can be deafening. Jean McClellan spends her time in almost complete silence, limited to just one hundred words a day. Anymore, and a thousand volts of electricity will course through her veins. Now the new government is in power, everything has changed. But only if you're a woman. Almost overnight, bank accounts are frozen, passports are taken away and seventy million women lose their jobs.

This is only the beginning...



Her name was Henrietta Lacks, but scientists know her as HeLa. She was a poor Southern tobacco farmer whose cancer cells became one of the most important tools in medicine. Rebecca Skloot takes the reader on an extraordinary journey in search of Henrietta's story.



The story follows the lives of ordinary high school students as typical literary tropes of teenage novels such as zombie invasion and terminal illness are played out in everyday life around them.







Mrs williamson recommends, The Book Thief by Markus Zusak.

"This is a beautiful and touching story cleverly told by the character 'Death'. It is an interesting book because, although it is written about life in Nazi Germany, it is written about the experiences of German people at that time and their suffering during World War 2, including at the hands of the British. This is a perspective that we sometimes fail to consider. This book can be difficult to read as some of the events are very tragic. But it makes you consider how kindness will always exist, no matter how difficult the circumstances. I would highly recommend this book to anybody looking for some historical fiction, but have a packet of tissues at the ready!"

Mr Smith recommends, Off the Map by Alastair Bonnett.

"A good book if you have a bit of wanderlust, or are interested in weird and wonderful places, underground cities, lost spaces and even places that don't exist (think platform 9 ¾ Harry Potter fans, although of course that now does exist!!). It is full of lots of short chapters for a quick read into different spaces that have been claimed, annexed or invented, and the history behind those. I even learned that there was a newly forming "Trash Island" in the Pacific that is 22 times the size of Belgium, and more about the Aralqum Desert, which used to be a sea before human influence and climate change."
