# **Oxford University 2025 Trip**

# As part of the annual Oxford trip, I and nine other students resided at Queen's College for a one night residential.

Over the course of our two-day trip, we completed various activities from taking part in university application workshops to receiving guided tours from students that attend each of the different colleges situated in Oxford. After we arrived, we spent some time getting to know the city independently, not just for the rest of our trip but for the possibility of attending in the future. During the evening on night one of our trip, we had the privilege of attending a useful talk from one of the representatives of Oxford University. Here, we all learnt how to formulate a personal statement as well as being told how other factors such as admissions tests and interviews affect the application process. After the talk, we were given some free time to establish a well-constructed plan for the course of action on the second day of our trip.

During our first night, we had the opportunity to stay in student accommodation at The Queen's College and also try the catered food menu provided to all students who stay at such college. This gave us the chance to truly experience student life at Oxford as well as gain plenty of useful information about what sort of accommodation we may want in the future.

As we explored the city campus of Oxford, we were introduced to the vast array of courses and academic opportunities available in a collegiate university. Being introduced to the large number of societies that all students can participate in, we were shown how these enhance university life and engage students socially with like-minded ambitious individuals. Being informed about the subjects on offer and extra curricular from current students allowed us to hear their honest opinions, thoughts and constructive guidance on the application process to achieve a place at Oxford.

Reflecting on this great residential, through the broad array of opportunities, experiencing a snippet of university life at Oxford we were shown the dynamic student life, world leading academic opportunity and communal atmosphere inspiring in us an ambition to aim for a place at Oxford or Cambridge.

# Students experience the classics at Ancient Greek Drama Festival at Warwick University

This links to a major unit in their studies. Students participated in several lectures and seminars, giving them a taste of studying at undergraduate level. They then watched a performance of Aeschylus' Agamemnon. Students were also able to get a feel for a university campus and an idea of student life.

# **Bikeability Training for all Students**

The Pathways students welcomed Go Velo into their classes in February, as they started their four-week cycle training course and basic bike maintenance.
